Ed Lenik's Comments on Louis Berger CRM Reports

Phase 1A report:

- A Historical background & research are thin. There is too much emphasis on "boiler plate" prehistoric background.
- ▲ Local project area background is meager. There is no evidence that any of the local resources listed below were consulted in the Phase 1A, which is supposed to be a through investigation of the background of the site and area.
 - 1. Orange County Historical Society archives
 - 2. Local informants such as Doc Bayne of the Friends of Sterling Forest, Jeff Hutchinson at Sterling Forest State Park Visitors Center, Sue Scher, and the Ramapough Lenape Indian Nation.
 - 3. Books such as Jim Ransom's *Vanishing Ironworks in the Ramapos*, Ed Lenik's two books on the Ramapough Mountain Indians
 - 4. Palisades Interstate Park Commission's prehistoric site records
- A There are some rather funny proof-reading errors iron Forgeries, not forges were big business up here? Entertaining as this might be, it suggests a certain rushed sloppiness in the final report.
- More current scholarly sources are available and should have been consulted. Some of the background material is outdated, again suggesting this was a rushed report.

Phase 1B and Phase II reports:

- 1. I cannot evaluate these without copies of the full reports. Apparently, these are not finished yet.
- 2. Very little information has been provided on the foundation that was located. It seems there is no data on who lived there or owned the property. That being the case, a Phase II research step would have been to do a deed search. Assuming this was done, the data or a comment on lack of data this work provided should have been in the summary.

In sum, I cannot be assured these Cultural Resources Management reports represent a thorough investigation of this property. The rushed nature of the Phase 1A gives me doubts. Louis Berger is a company with a good reputation, but until the three <u>full</u> reports are available, the questions of what cultural resources are here and how they should be managed cannot be answered.
